

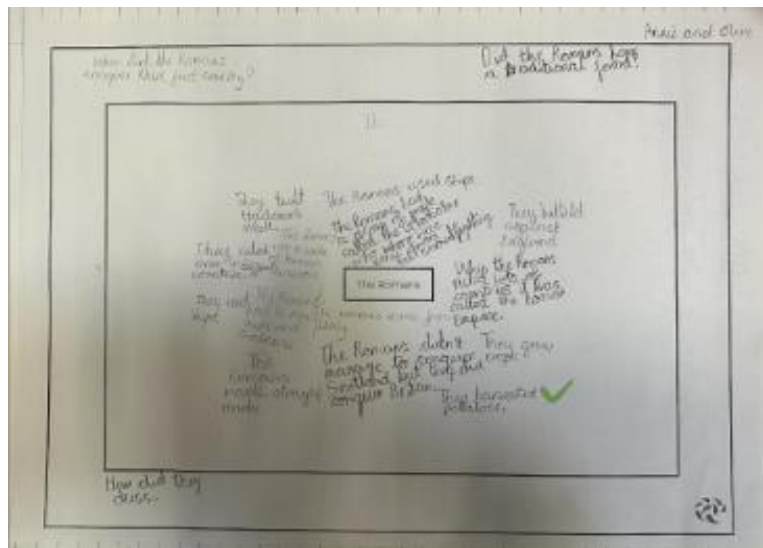
Thinking Frames

Thinking Frames are a visual tool for thinking and learning. They are a graphic organiser to support children organising their thoughts around a topic area or learning objective. They reduce cognitive load and writing time.

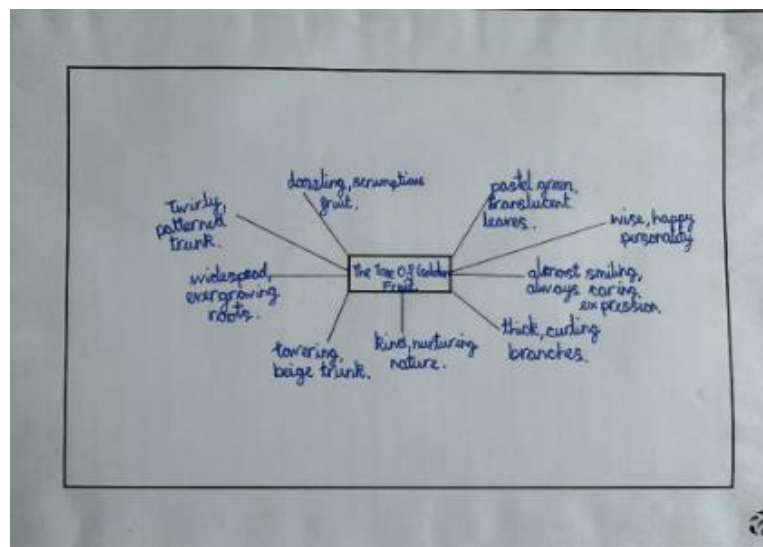
They support Ben Rhydding Primary School's teaching and learning focus to Make Thinking Visible. Children can use thinking frames individually, in pairs or in groups.

There are a range of thinking frames and they serve different purposes.

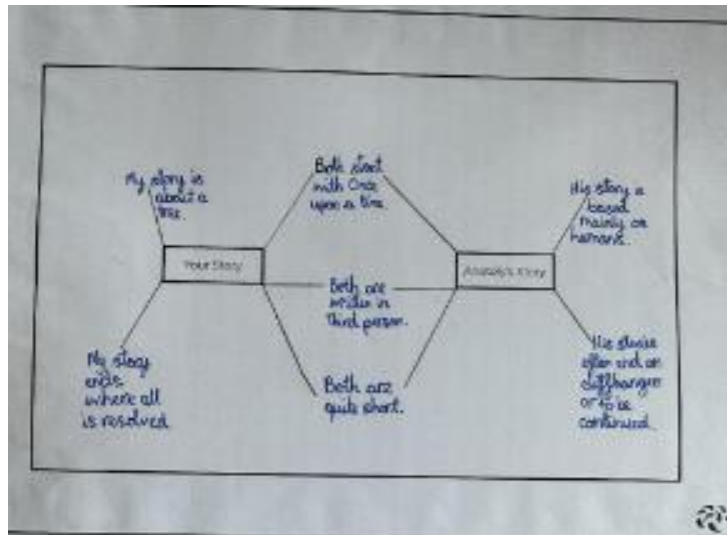
Defining - Pick out the key concepts of a topic or theme



Describing - Similar to the defining frame but this uses lines to pick out words/phrases to describe something



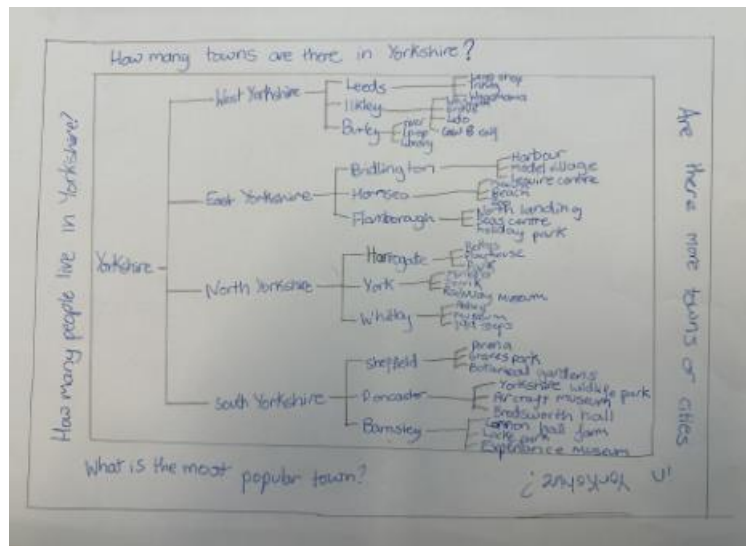
Compare/Contrast - Used to pick out similarities and differences



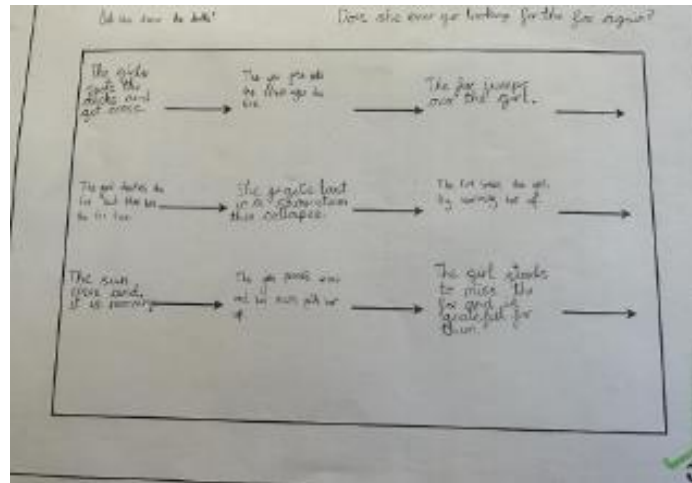
Categorising - Used to break down a topic into different areas



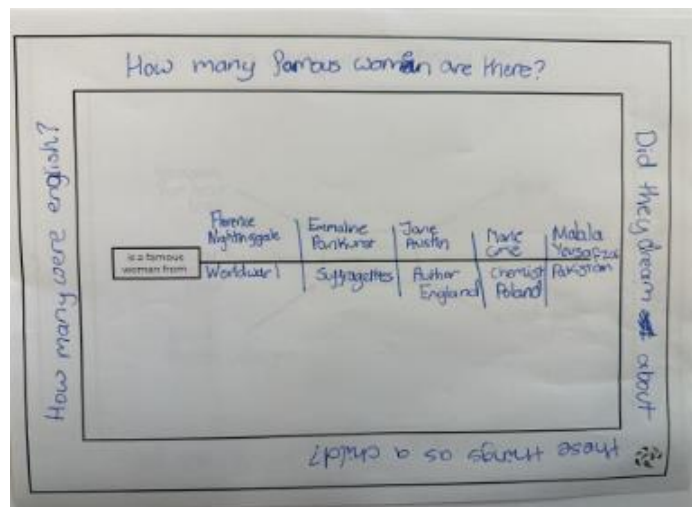
Whole Part - Used to break a subject into parts



Sequencing - Helps to order events



Connecting - Supports making links and connections between a theme



Cause/Effect - Structures thinking so children can think of the causes of an events and the effects of it.
